Reflections of Rev. Randy Nolen

I wish I could take credit for the following, but I can't. It was emailed to me years ago by a member of the church I pastored in St. Louis.

The Prodigal Son in the Key of "F"

Feeling footloose, fancy free and frisky, a featherbrained fellow forced his fond father to fork over his farthings. Fast he flew to foreign fields and frittered his family's fortune, feasting fabulously with floozies and faithless friends. Flooded with flattery he financed a full-fledged fling of funny foam and fast food.

Fleeced by his fellows in folly, facing famine, and feeling faintly fuzzy, he found himself a feed-flinger in a filthy foreign farmyard. Feeling frail and fairly famished, he fain would have filled his frame with foraged food from the fodder fragments. "Fooey," he figured. "My father's flunkies fare far fancier," the frazzled fugitive fumed feverishly, facing the facts. Finally, frustrated from failure and filled with foreboding (but following his feelings) he fled from the filthy foreign farmyard.



Faraway, the father focused on the fretful familiar form in the field and flew to him and fondly flung his forearms around the fatigued fugitive. Falling at his father's feet, the fugitive floundered forlornly, "Father, I have flunked and fruitlessly forfeited family favor." Finally, the faithful father, forbidding and forestalling further flinching, frantically flagged the flunkies to fetch forth the finest fatling and fix a feast.

Faithfully the father's firstborn was in a fertile field fixing fences while father and fugitive were feeling festive. The foreman felt fantastic as he flashed the fortunate news of a familiar family face that had forsaken fatal foolishness. Forty-four feet from the farmhouse the firstborn found a farmhand fixing a fatling. Frowning and finding fault, he found father and fumed, "Floozies and foam from frittered family funds and you fix a feast following the fugitive's folderol?

The firstborn's fury flashed, but fussing was futile. The frugal firstborn felt it was fitting to feel favored for his faithfulness and fidelity to family, father, and farm. In foolhardy fashion, he faulted the father for failing to furnish a fatling and feast for friends.

His folly was not in feeling fit for a feast and fatling for friends; rather his flaw was in his feeling about the fairness of the festival for the found fugitive. His fundamental fallacy was a fixation on favoritism, not forgiveness.

Any focus on feeling favored will fester and friction will force the faded facade to fall. Frankly, the father felt the frigid firstborn's frugality of forgiveness was formidable and frightful. But the father's former faithful fortitude and fearless forbearance to forgive both fugitive and firstborn flourishes.

The farsighted father figured, "Such fidelity is fine, but what forbids festivity for the fugitive that is found? Unfurl the flags and finery, let fun and frolic freely flow. Former failure is forgotten, folly is forsaken." Forgiveness forms the foundation for future fortune.

Four facets of the father's fathomless fondness for faltering fugitives are:

- 1. Forgiveness
- 2. Forever faithful friendship
- 3. Fadeless love
- 4. A facility for forgetting

It is always interesting to look at Scripture with fresh eyes. Sometimes the old words become so familiar they lose their meaning. I hope this retelling of the Prodigal Son parable will perhaps bring you new insights into the text.

The basic message remains intact. The foundation of our faith is God's amazing grace. We have done nothing to earn it; indeed we can do nothing to earn it. But God doesn't care. God gives it to us anyway. Presbyterians in the past have been somewhat like the older brother. Our theology of predestination convinced us that we were the chosen, and everyone else was not. We wanted to keep the fatted calf for ourselves. But the error in our thinking (which crept in after John Calvin's death: Calvin did not think this) is that because we are predestined to be saved, others must be predestined for condemnation. It ain't necessarily so. God's grace is such that God can decide to save everyone. Scripture tells us that, because the possibility exists that some may miss out on God's grace, we have an obligation to spread the Word of God to all we meet, but ultimately the choice of who is saved belongs solely to

God. And when you stop to think about it, we should all be grateful for that.

Noah Park and Esther Shin

Associates for Ecumenical
Partnerships in Egypt since 2016
Serving with the Evangelical
Presbyterian Church of Egypt,
Synod of the Nile

Noah Park and Esther Shin, a married couple, serve as professors at the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Cairo (ETCS). Noah teaches New

Testament, and Esther teaches Christian education. ETCS, a ministry of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church in Egypt, is one of a handful of seminaries in the Middle East that trains future Protestant pastors.

Presbyterian mission personnel founded the school in 1863. The seminary located in Cairo has two academic centers, one in Minya/Upper Egypt, and one in Alexandria. Though most of its 350 students are from Egypt, some come from elsewhere in the Arab world, including Syria and Sudan, to prepare for service in churches in their home countries. ETSC also recently launched a distance learning program for Arabic speakers around the world.

Dear Friends,

During resilience trainings, when speaking to communities who have faced a disaster, we invite participants to be part of a closing ritual. We share an image of a bowl that was cracked but has been repaired using an ancient technique called kintsugi, or "golden joinery." Beautiful seams of gold glint in the cracks of ceramicware, giving a unique appearance to the piece. This repair method celebrates each item's unique history by emphasizing its fractures and breaks instead of hiding or disguising them. Kintsugi often makes the repaired piece even more beautiful than the original, giving it new life. The kintsugi method conveys a philosophy not of replacement, but acceptance of change, reverence, and restoration. The gold-filled cracks of a once-broken item are a testament to what it has been through.

We then invite everyone to come and pick a magnet with an image of a kintsugi bowl to remind them of their wholeness, strength, and value, all of which empowers them to continue serving those in need.

Many of the communities we serve understand this idea of kintsugi. Weeks, months, and sometimes even years later, when communities affected by a disaster look back, they also see cracked spirits and emotional wounds that have been healed or are still in repair. Friendships formed, coalitions working together, neighbors that have become family; organizations, churches, leaders who have responded to the call to serve, to seam the cracks of disaster.

During this time of year, as we celebrate the power of the resurrection, we are transformed once again by the Spirit of God that continues to bring healing and restoration in the chaos of our lives and our communities. Through your donation(s), you have helped many communities in their process of repair. Through your support, PDA has provided critical assistance to those who have lost their homes, their loved ones, and their sense of security. We are grateful for your contribution and the impact it has on so many people. Your generosity has helped us bring hope and healing to those broken by disaster, so they can also see their wholeness, strength, and value.

May the power of the Resurrected Christ bless us in our journey.
